Learning Areas: Humanities

Discussion questions:

- At the start of the story Isaiah Firebrace writes "I want everyone who reads this book to understand more about First Nations People and the true history of our country". Can you describe something new that you learnt? Why do you think Isaiah wants people to understand more about First Nations people and the history of Australia?
- Can you identify the difference between a 'Welcome to Country' and an 'Acknowledgement of Country'? What role do they play when people come together for events in Australia?
- Describe some of the ways in which First Nations people care for Country.
- Isaiah talks about the importance of music, songs and storytelling in First Nations culture. Why are these things important? How are they part of indigenous culture?
- Can you think of a story or song that you have learnt from your family or culture? How did you learn it and how does it make you feel?
- Why are Elders referred to as 'Aunty' or 'Uncle'? How are they an important part of First Nations communities?
- Use the <u>AIATIS map</u> to locate the different First Nations groups mentioned in the book.
- Come Together includes facts as well as Isaiah's own personal stories. Why do you think he has chosen to include these? What do they add to the book?

Story response ideas:

A. Jigsaw Investigation: In groups of 3-4, each select a different topic from *Come Together to* investigate further.

- 1. Start by noting down what you already **knew** about the topic prior to reading the story, in the '**Know**' section of a **KWL chart**.
- 2. Then write down what you have now 'Learnt' about the topic after viewing the story.

Story response ideas continued...

- 3. In the 'Wonderings' section, write down what you would like to still find out.
- 4. Use resources such <u>ABC Education</u> other <u>First Nations' stories</u> on Story Box Library to gather further information that will help to answer your wonderings.
- 5. Once you have done your research, take turns in your group to share your findings with each other. Make sure you listen respectfully and provide time to discuss these findings together.
- 6. On the back of your KWL chart, make a note of something new you have discovered from each of your group members.
- **B. Comparing non-fiction texts:** <u>Heroes, Rebels and Innovators</u> is another First Nations book that includes factual information about Indigenous culture, in particular inspiring stories about Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people from history. Use a **Venn Diagram** to compare this book with *Come Together*. What are the similarities and differences? Think about the following when making your comparisons:
 - Structure of the book how is the information/stories organised?
 - Authors purpose what does the author want the reader to find out?
 - Content what is the book about? Are there any common themes?
 - **Tone** what is the authors attitude towards the subject? E.g. is it hopeful, humourous, joyful, optimistic, respectful, negative, doubtful, proud etc.
 - Language how has language been used? E.g. word choices and language devices (such as, repetition, similes, metaphors, rhetorical questions etc).
 - Audience who is this book for? How would it interest or engage this audience?
 - Illustrations and imagery what do you notice about the use of colour, the style of illustrations, the choice of images etc.
- C. About the Author. Did you know that Isaiah Firebrace...
 - presented a petition with over 290,000 signatures to parliament calling for Aboriginal History to be taught in primary and secondary schools?
 - is an Indigenous singer who won the eighth season of The X Factor Australia in 2016?






Learning tasks:

After viewing the story, choose one of the following 3 activities to complete.

a. Exploring culture through story: Browse the selection of First Nations' stories on Story Box Library. Many of these stories also explore the topics that Isaiah has described in Come Together. For example, Jasmine Seymour's Baby Business tells the story of a smoking ceremony to welcome baby to Country.

Can you find other First Nations' stories on the website that also explore the topics featured in *Come Together?* Use the **T-Chart** below to make a list of topics in featured in *Come Together*. E.g Ceremonies, Caring for Country, The Dreaming etc. In the opposite column, write the titles of other First Nation stories that also feature these topics.


b. Writing to the author: Read the <u>short bio</u> about Isaiah Firebrace, the author of *Come Together*, as well as the article on the NITV website: <u>Isaiah Firebrace: from humble beginnings, now a second shot at glory</u>

Write a **Letter** to Isaiah to share with him your thoughts about *Come Together*. You might like to include:

- what you enjoyed
- what you learnt
- connections you made with the story
- questions about the book
- questions or comments about his work with Aboriginal communities.

c. Create a mini glossary: You may have come across new terminology/words in the book that you hadn't seen or heard before. Select 3 words from *Come Together* and explain in your own words, what they mean. You might like to create an illustration to go with each of your explanations.
